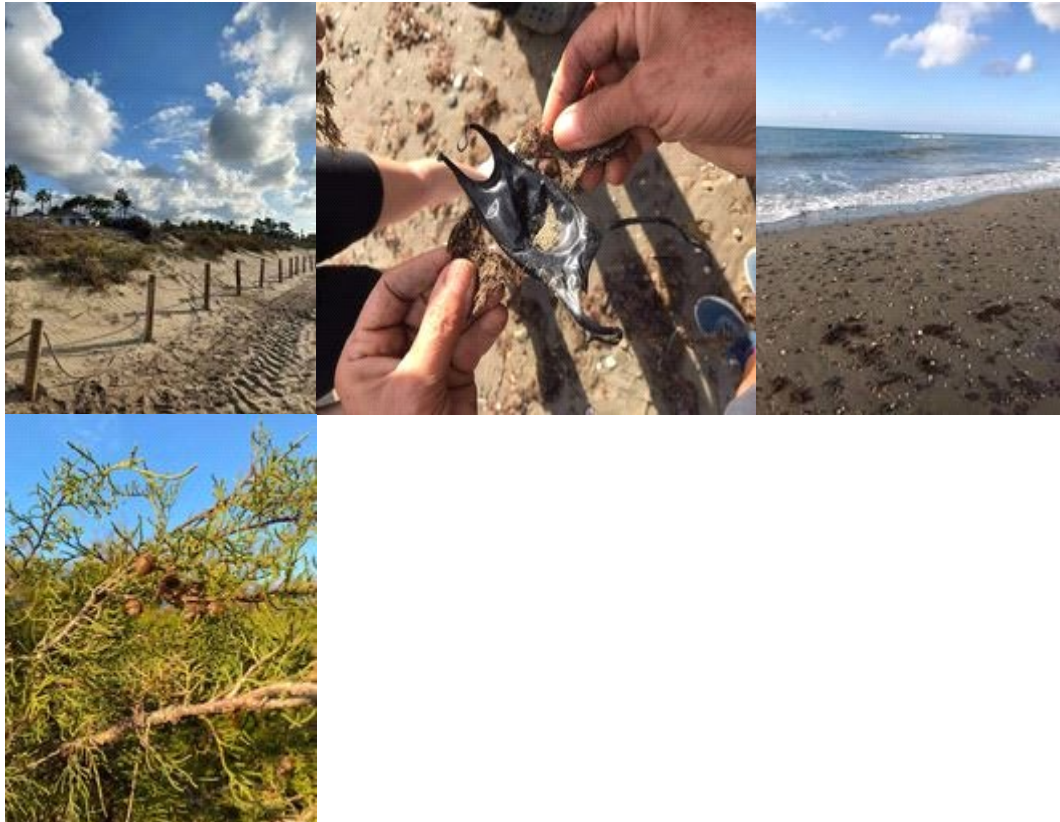


Day 1

That day we collected Sabine whose main habitats are: sandy soils and dunes. Its leaves are folded, overlapping, which distinguishes it from juniper. Then, walking along the beach, we got to know the species of fauna and flora of the Mediterranean Sea.



Day 2

On the second day of the internship in the conference room of the hostel there was an interview with Maria from Produnas. We learned about the benefits of dunes, for example, to protect houses or to provide habitat for extensive fauna and flora. Natural factors as well as humans can pose a threat to the dunes. The coast of Marbella has 10 dunes that are subject to various protection.



Day 3

That day we went to the dunes where there was a meeting with the Lord from the city of Marbella. We learned that the formation of dunes is closely related to the transport of sandy material: sand blown by the wind close to the surface or dragged along it stops behind obstacles such as boulders, brush or ground irregularities - when it accumulates, it forms a dune. The Lord also told us how the inhabitants of this city protect it and the entire environment around it. After the meeting, we pulled out a plant called edible carp. Despite the fact that it is located on islands, it hinders the growth of primary plants for the dunes.



Day 4

That day we took care of the cleanliness of the dunes. While walking along the dunes, we collected rubbish. We've come across a lot of strange finds. We could also see with our own eyes all species of plants living in the dunes. In addition to plants, we could also see animals, including hares.



Day 5

We spent the fifth day in the dunes raking dry leaves Giant reed . We collected them in baskets and ordered them into a container. we threw stones into the hole. On this day, we finished work at the Produnas company. We were thanked, we took commemorative photos and said goodbye to the wonderful people we met there.
