Thank you for your commitment and for helping to keep this natural environment clean and protected. This is how we care for Marbella's environmental heritage!



ENVIRONMENTAL ACTION DAY WITH THE PABLO DEL SAZ HIGH SCHOOL IN REAL DE ZARAGOZA



A few days ago we spent an enriching time with the Pablo del Saz High School students, dedicated to learning environmental awareness, and the eradication of Foreign Invasive Species (FIS) in the Real de Zaragoza dune area.

During the activity, we removed Highway Ice plant (*Carpobrotus edulis*); an FIS that threatens the ecological balance of our dunes.

Thanks to the commitment of the students and teachers in the Dune Sponsorship "Program for Schoolchildren, we continue to inculcate active and responsible environmental awareness, which is the key to protecting and conserving our coastline.



Throughout the month of June, all primary school students from CEIP Miguel Hernández visited the Real de Zaragoza section of the Ecological Reserve – Dunes of Marbella to take part in the eradication of the invasive species *Carpobrotus edulis* (commonly known as ice plant or pigface).

Thanks to the involvement of over 250 students, nearly all of the ice plant in this dune area was removed. An exemplary environmental education effort that shows how, step by step, younger generations are becoming key players in conserving our natural heritage.
